Andy Goldsworthy

- **Andy Goldsworthy OBE** (Born 26th July 1956)
- **He** is an English sculptor, photographer, and environmentalist who produces sculptures and land art situated in natural and urban settings.

Caroline Gregson

- **Caroline Gregson** is a local artist.
- She uses willow and other basketry materials to create willow sculptures.

Ancient Egyptian Art

- **Ancient Egyptian art** refers to art produced in ancient Egypt between the 31st century BC and the 4th century AD.
- Much of the artwork created by the Ancient Egyptians had to do with their religion. They would fill the tombs of the Pharaohs with paintings and sculpture to help the person in the afterlife.
- The Egyptians are famous for their giant works of sculptures. Some examples of this include the Great Sphinx of Giza.



Paul Cezanne

- **Paul Cézanne** (19 January 1839 - 22 October 1906) was a French painter.
- He produced more than 900 oil paintings and 400 watercolours, including many incomplete works.
- Cézanne was mainly a post-impressionist painter.



Georgia O'Keeffe

- **Georgia O'Keeffe** (15th November 1887 – 6th March 1986)
- She was an American artist.
- She was known for her paintings of enlarged flowers..
- O'Keeffe was one of the first female painters to achieve worldwide acclaim.



The Post Impressionists

- The **post-impressionists** were artists of the late 19th century who saw the work of the French Impressionist painters and were influenced by them.
- These artists developed the ideas of impressionism.
- They continued using the real-life subject matter, with vivid colours, often with thick paint like the Impressionists.
- They added other ideas by using geometric forms, to distorting form for effect, and using unnatural colours.

Stone Age Art

- Stone Age art can be known as Pre-historic art.
- Early humans painted animals they hunted on cave walls.
- Examples of these cave paintings can be seen at Lascaux in France.
- They also created sculptures from clay, ivory, bone or carved stone.
